

Types of Dependent Clause

A **noun clause** is a dependent clause that functions as a noun in a sentence.

Example: Do you know where I had gone during the summer holidays?

An **adjective clause**, also called a relative clause, is a dependent clause that functions as an adjective in a sentence.

Example: Harper, who is a brilliant student, has been awarded a scholarship.

An **adverb clause** is a dependent clause that functions as an adverb in a sentence.

Example: While we were in London, we visited Buckingham Palace.
