










Six Syllable Types

SYLLABLE TYPE	HINT	EXAMPLE
<p>Closed Syllable</p> <p><i>Ends with a consonant with a short vowel sound before it.</i></p> 	<p>Short sound</p> <p>CVC VC/CV</p>	 <p>dog</p>
<p>Open Syllable</p> <p><i>Ends with a long vowel sound.</i></p>	<p>Long sound</p>	 <p>do-nut</p>
<p>R-Control</p> <p><i>An "r" controls the sound of the vowel that is before it.</i></p>	<p>el by r</p>	 <p>purse</p>
<p>Silent-e</p> <p><i>A main long vowel followed by a silent "e" sound.</i></p>	<p>nd</p>	 <p>bone</p>
<p>Vowel Team</p> <p><i>Two vowels work together to make a long, short or diphthong vowel sound.</i></p> 	<p>oa, ea</p>	 <p>cloud</p>
<p>Consonant-le Syllable</p> <p><i>A consonant + letters "l" and "e" come at the end of the syllable.</i></p> 	<p>ending syllable</p> <p>c + le</p>	 <p>ap-ple</p>

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
