Future Perfect or Future Perfect Progressive

Future Perfect: It is used to say that something will be finished by a particular time in the future.

Example: I will have graduated from college by 2020.

Future Perfect Progressive: It refers to events that will start in the future and will continue to another time in the future.

Example: Rob will have been studying in this school for two years, before I join this Fall.
