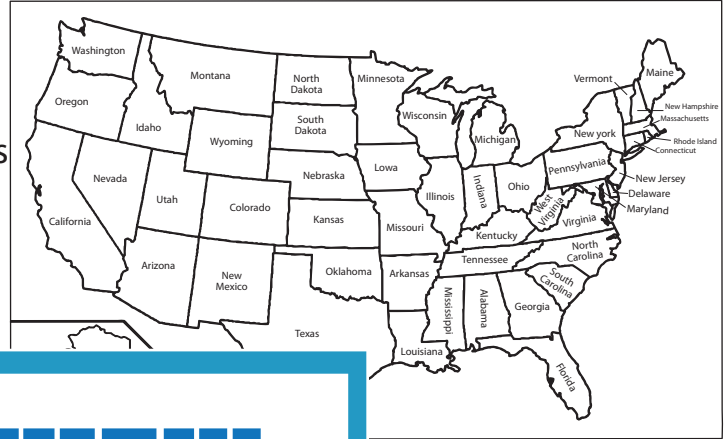


The Great Compromise of 1787

The government America had chosen would be a bicameral government. This meant it would be run by two houses of legislators rather than only one.

Both the House and the Senate have their own set of responsibilities.

For instance, only the House of Representatives can initiate bills that pertain to spending and revenue. The Senate must confirm the appointment of a new president and confirm the appointment of a new Supreme Court Justice. Now both the large and the small states have a voice in the way the government is run.
